ARC Awards

The John Ferneley College 'ARC' awards were launched in September this year with the aim of recognising students' academic achievement, alongside other contributions to school life, the Mowbray Education Trust and the wider community. There are three levels of achievement Bronze, Silver and Gold. To achieve a ARC award, students will need to demonstrate sustained commitment to their work in school as well as engagement in various activities both within school and in the wider community.

In January we will be having our first ARC awards assemblies to hand out prizes and certificates to those students who have achieved their Bronze or Silver award. It has been great for tutors and me as Deputy Head teacher to read about some of the amazing things that students have been doing in and out of school. So far over 300 of our students have represented the school in different events, some students have passed dance and music exams, many have volunteered at local events including the remembrance day parade and one students has completed a triathlon.

All students have been given and booklet and it would be great if they could continue to complete their commitments and be rewarded for their amazing achievements. This term we have been working closely with the Storehouse Soup Kitchen. STEM

Science Technology Engineering Maths

Students from Year 8 and 9 visited TeenTech in Leicester which helps young people understand the opportunities in the science, technology and engineering industries, no matter what their gender or social background. It was an exciting, hands on day led by industry with challenges and experiments helping them understand the wide range of opportunities in Science, Technology, Construction and Engineering.



Year 7 participated in the STEM Big Assembly which is an online interactive webinar. The assembly was all about engineering and the different roles within engineering and the theme was about diversity. Students heard first-hand from apprentices across the UK who have overcome diversity challenges to land the dream apprenticeship that they are currently doing and then had the opportunity to ask questions live through the chat facility.

Year 10 and 11 students enjoyed a day at Mars Petcare in Melton Mowbray hosted by the factory manager. They had a full factory tour and were then met members from the planning, logistics, quality, production and development departments. They then were split into teams and competed in a 'Dragons Den' competition to design a new product that had to meet cost, quality, nutrition, market, aesthetic, environmental and profit targets and present their proposal to members of the Mars management team. The winners were then rewarded with chocolates for their efforts. This was a great opportunity for students to see the many and varied careers inside a manufacturing organisation and have some fun at the same time.

Enrichment update

A group of year 11 students went to the Leicester Outdoor Pursuit Centre as part of their Sport Studies Course. Over the 2 days the group participated in a range of outdoor activities including a high ropes course, canoeing and team building activities. The group learnt about the different types of safety equipment and develop a number of skills such as team work, decision making, problem solving and communication skills.

On the 31st October and 1st November the geography department took 130 students to Hunstanton in Norfolk. This was part of their Component 3 Applied Fieldwork exam which makes up 30% of their GCSE.

Students were investigating the methods of qualitative data and concepts of sustainable communities. Students first visited Old Hunstanton where they explored the sand dunes investigating dune stabilisation and the cliffs where they could see physical evidence of erosion. They also carried out bi-polar surveys and annotated field sketches.

Next students were taken to New Hunstanton where they continued with their bi-polar surveys and annotated field sketches but they also experimented with sampling strategies when they were conducting their questionnaires.

Finally we enjoyed a good helping of hot chocolate and cakes but of course you can't go to the seaside without eating some fish and chips!

To celebrate the introduction of German to the John Ferneley curriculum, this December the Year 7s were treated to a trip to the Birmingham Christmas Markets. The largest outside of Germany and Austria, students sampled some typical German food (probably too many sweets) and experienced the atmosphere of an authentic Weihnachtsmarkt.

Thursday 26th September was the European Day of Languages, where diversity, culture and, of course, languages are celebrated. John Ferneley was brightly decorated with foreign greetings to highlight the multitude of languages spoken in Europe and the rest of the world. The MFL team organised a host of activities including lessons in other foreign languages such as Russian, a treasure hunt to match teachers to which other languages they speak (there were quite a few!), a MFL quiz and a guest speaker, who shared the exciting experiences and opportunities learning languages gave to her. We look forward to celebrating with our other MET schools next year!

As part of our first 'Drop Down Day' this year, the English team had the pleasure of hosting Asian singer, 'K Zie' on a Discrimination, British Values & Mental Health themed school tour. The morning began with a performance from 'K Zie' and fellow singer 'Enelic', followed by a presentation on mental health and bullying, discrimination and a discussion around the fundamental British Values. The main message was to empower students to make the right choices and to have the confidence to speak up about their state of mind, something that we believe is important to promote mental health awareness as a college.

Students later had a Q&A session followed by showcasing some of their very own talent with willing students taking to the stage themselves. Our very own Miss Pedder was the overall hit with her version of 'No Scrubs'. This exciting event was followed by an autograph session and the chance to get snaps with the up and coming artists.

It was lovely to see a buzz around the college; the auditorium came alive during the performances - students were dancing and getting in to the spirit of the day. Many commented on how much they enjoyed the experience and felt that it was an exciting way to talk about serious issues affecting young people today.

This term saw the launch of the new Creative Writing Club at John Ferneley College. Each Monday after school, students from years 7, 8 and 9 met in the library to develop their writing talent. The aim was to encourage to students to write about things that interest and inspire them as well as exploring new genres and ideas that they may not have thought to use before through various activities. Students thoroughly enjoyed these sessions.

On 29th October we invited Jo Sennitt into John Ferneley College to hold Book Talking sessions for all our Year 7 students. Jo read extracts from a wide variety of books ranging from chilling tales, thrillers, horror stories, romance, friendship and humour. Jo inspired students to choose a book to read for pleasure and to try a different genre from their normal choice of book.

Our students were fantastic, listening enthralled to the stories. One student, Haille said she liked the sound of all the books Jo read out in her session and they were books she wouldn't normally read. Another Year 7 student, Megan said she really enjoyed the presentation and she is now interested in trying a new book.

Feedback from one of our English teachers, "The students really enjoyed it, the kids came back buzzing and thinking about the books they would like to read in the future".

All the books Jo talked about are stocked in the library. We had queues of students after the Book Talking waiting to take the books out on loan. Popular ones were "13 Hours" by Narinder Dhami, a tense thriller and "My Embarrassing Dad's gone viral" by Ben Davis, a hilarious comedy story about filming Dad's antics for YouTube.

On 26th November a group of Year 7 students went on a library trip to the Creative Learning Services Library in Glenfield. The aim of the trip was to encourage a passion for reading for pleasure by introducing our students to a wealth of different genres of books, to broaden their horizons and to increase their confidence. They were tasked in finding and choosing a range of books to bring back to stock our school library. The staff at CLS welcomed our students and at the end of the visit said they had been delightful.

Futures

JFC held an apprenticeship evening for Year 9, 10 & 11 to gain advice from a fantastic range of providers which include Police, Army, MARS, Heart of England training, ASK apprenticeships, MBC, Ragdale Hall and RPC Superfos. Also, the local colleges including Brooksby, Loughborough, Grantham and Leicester. The providers were able to give information on the types of apprenticeships and courses/ careers pathways that they offered for the students to improve their knowledge on the next steps and possible futures careers. We had a great turn-out and all students and parents that attended complimented the providers on the knowledge and information that they received.

I would like to thank Miss Shotton for all the help with organising the careers events in school.

During the month of December all year groups 7-11 have had either workshops or assemblies where they were given some expert advice on the local labour market where they have learnt about the jobs prospects and industry sectors within Leicestershire and the types of employers that were within Melton Mowbray. They have been surprised at the amount of small to medium sized businesses within Melton and also the amount of revenue that the top 5 employers generate each year. This information has highlighted the requirements and skills that will be needed in the futures and generates food for thought on their next steps after JFC. As well as the Labour Market Information (LMI), Year 9 students have been given advice on why a C.V is essential and the areas that need to be considered when applying for future employment and college courses.

We would like to thank Rebecca Leadbetter from DWP for her support in delivering this information which forms part of the Careers programme within JFC.




